St Bartholomew

Did Bartholomew (Nathanael) and Jesus know each other before Bartholomew became an apostle? It's thought that he came from Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle, so was he at the wedding feast where jars of water were transformed into high quality wine? If Jesus could describe Bartholomew as "an Israelite in whom there is no guile" and referred to a fig tree, where was that tree and what had Jesus seen? Whatever the incident, it's a hefty compliment.



The fifth-century writers Eusebius of Caesaria and St Jerome say that Bartholomew travelled to India, where he left behind a copy of Matthew's Gospel. Others say missionary journeys included Ethiopia, Mesopotamia, Parthia, Lycaonia and Greater Armenia, where he was eventually martyred. His relics are entombed in the church of St Bartholomew on Rome's Tiber Island.

St Bartholomew is the patron saint of leather workers and people troubled with nervous and neurological diseases and ailments.
