Jesus knew what he was saying when he asked us to go, not just the one mile but an extra one into the bargain. Personal time and energy are precious commodities which we don't always want to share. Unfortunately, my “to do” list can always extend to fill every available moment so adding your catalogue of requirements to mine risks stressing me out to the same extent that you feel relieved of your burdens. Life isn't easy, is it?

Jesus wants me, however, to try harder at making peace. It's often good to take a deep breath and avoid harsh words which can't be retracted.

The late Archbishop Desmond Tutu declared, “If you want peace, you don't talk to your friends. You talk to your enemies.” He understood the meaning of today's Gospel reading which, in many ways, summarises the entire Gospel. We're called to be peacemakers. We're invited to be generous with our resources. We're challenged to build bridges and to nurture relationships. If that means walking the extra mile, it's worth it, isn't it?
